Proposed Legislation for Routine Opt-Out HIV Testing Gains Support

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends that HIV testing be done as a part of routine medical testing in all healthcare settings for individuals ages 13 to 64, with consent for HIV testing inferred unless the patient declines (routine opt-out testing). Delaware is one of a few states left in the country that still follows the antiquated procedure of requiring written consent for an HIV test (opt-in testing). Support continues to grow for changing Delaware's law to meet the CDC recommendations, as almost all other states have done.

The Consortium's Policy Committee has written a position paper endorsing the CDC recommendations. Already over 40 organizations and individuals have signed on in support. In January 2011, Wilmington City Council passed a resolution in support of the proposed legislation regarding opt-out testing.

A proposed routine opt-out testing bill, drafted by the state Division of Public Health, adopts the CDC's recommendations. The result would make testing for HIV routine and help reduce stigma, fear and discrimination.

This proposed legislation is expected to be introduced to the legislature in early 2012. State Senator (D) Patricia “Patty” Blevins has enthusiastically agreed to be sponsor of this bill in the Senate. Director of Community Planning and Policy Development, Marla Blunt-Carter, says this bill will soon have a sponsor from the House as well as additional organizational support.

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Dear Friends,

This year, cities throughout the U.S. share a common historic event: 2011 marks the 25th anniversary of the AIDS Walk. It also is the 25th anniversary for many AIDS service organizations as well. The AIDS Walk was the country's first response to the epidemic in fundraising while creating awareness for HIV/AIDS. It signified a community's solidarity in fighting stigma and the demand for essential services for a disease that no one wanted to talk about, while raising critical funds.

In so many ways we have made tremendous progress, yet it feels as though, sometimes, we have also taken a few steps backwards. Successful new drug therapies continue to change the face of this disease and improve the lives of millions worldwide. But in a way this miracle has also helped create some challenges by perhaps giving us a false sense of security and allowing us to fall back into complacency. It took away the sense of urgency in the fight. The idea that you can take a pill and everything will be OK is not acceptable. Complacency is not acceptable. The AIDS epidemic is not acceptable and it is far from over. If anything, it is gaining steam. Just last month, a disturbing new report on MSNBC indicated that unprotected sex among young people in the U.S. had increased by 39 percent over the last two years. In France the rate skyrocketed to 111 percent. Again, I say, this is not acceptable.

In the nearly nine minutes it will take you to read this letter, the HIV virus will have infected another person in the US. They are young, gay, straight, female, male, and seniors, Black, Latino, Asian and White. They are us. They are you and me and our neighbors, our brothers, our aunts, our nieces and nephews...our children and friends. This, too, is unacceptable.

Despite these ominous statistics, support continues to dwindle in communities throughout Delaware while support flourishes in other areas in the U.S. We are no different than our neighbors to the east, west, north and south. We may have been smaller in numbers, but not smaller in heart and generosity. I know this because I have seen Delaware's kindness and support first hand. I ask you to make a pledge today that you will help raise awareness and funds in the upcoming year because if we don't, we will lose some incredible organizations that provide critical services to our HIV community. We can no longer think that someone else will "do it". We need to return to our grassroots activism of the 1980s to reduce complacency.

Encouraging to the Walk this year was the tremendous political clout that was shown at this year's AIDS Walk by the attendance of Mayor James Baker, Councilwoman Hanifa Shabazz, Congressman John Carney and Senator Chris Coons. In fact, Senator Coons has taken on another task by committing to serving on the newly organized Bicameral HIV/AIDS Caucus. Let him inspire us to also do more. Now is the time because we are at a major crossroads. We are facing major funding shortfalls, waning interest and very little media attention. We must get back to our grassroots efforts of 25 years ago or face the reality that this epidemic will turn on us again and devastate our communities like it did in the 1980s.

We need everyone to leave his or her footprint in the fight against this disease. I hope the 25th anniversary of the AIDS Walk and many AIDS organizations will renew our spirit, renew our determination, renew our drive and commitment to making a difference until we end this epidemic, because we can do it.

Donation Helps Make Employment Workshops Possible

Daily life for people living with HIV today is much different than it was in the 1980s and 1990s. Most people with HIV live normal, healthy lives as long as they take their medications as directed and remain in care. While many HIV positive individuals maintain full or part-time jobs, others depend on Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) checks for income. Some of those receiving SSDI benefits have seen improvements to their health and are curious or thinking about returning to work, but are unsure of where to begin the process or who to ask for help.

To help clients begin the process of getting back to work, AIDS Delaware recently hosted a series of free workshops on this topic called "Becoming Successfully Employed". The Delaware HIV Consortium was able to provide financial support for these workshops thanks to a recent anonymous donation made in honor of Sister Dolores Macklin, Board Member

Emeritus of the Delaware HIV Consortium.

Katt Rivera, Assistant Director of Client Services at AIDS Delaware, said she had a concern to help clients learn more about their options for returning to work. "Working helps improve a person's self-esteem and overall health," says Rivera. She arranged for representatives from the local Social Security Administration and Vocational Rehab offices to come speak to clients and answer any questions in a setting that didn't feel intimidating. In addition, clients received tips on resume writing and job-hunting and information about the types of jobs that are available today.

Plans are in the works to launch another round of workshops in early 2012, though a date has not yet been set. Clients interested in signing up for this program (or service providers who wish to be notified when a date is set for these workshops) are encouraged to call AIDS Delaware today at 302-652-6776.

25th Anniversary of AIDS Walk Delaware Commemorated

The sun shone brightly on this year's AIDS Walk Delaware in Wilmington on October 1, and the hundreds of people that gathered on the Riverfront thoroughly enjoyed the new walk route and live music performed by Club Phred. This year marked 25 years that AIDS Walk Delaware has brought together the HIV/AIDS community, devoted community members, people living with HIV and so many more to raise funds and awareness for HIV/AIDS throughout the state of Delaware. AIDS Walk Delaware is presented by AIDS Delaware and the Delaware HIV Consortium along with partner organizations Faith Community Partnership and Ministry of Caring.

While overall funds raised were lower than last year, the Del-

aware HIV Consortium is proud to announce that our team, for the third year in a row, brought in more funds than any other team in the state- more than \$16,000.

This year's AIDS Walk had the most support from elected officials in recent memory, despite a smaller crowd than in years past. Elected officials that addressed the crowd before step-off included County Executive Paul Clark, City Council Member Hanifa Shabazz, U.S. Congressman John Carney and U.S. Senator Chris Coons. Wilmington's Mayor James Baker was also in attendance at the event in Wilmington which included a first-time certified run that attracted over 110 participants.

Results of Worldwide Study Show Increase in Unsafe Sex

A recently published survey of more than 5,400 teenagers (ages 15-19) from around the world calls attention to higher rates of unprotected sex among youth and widespread ignorance about how to protect themselves against sexually transmitted infections and pregnancy. The survey, *Clueless or Clued-up: Your right to be informed about contraception*, was released on World Contraception Day, September 26, and is endorsed by numerous international health organizations. Teens from 26 countries on every continent were interviewed for this extensive survey.

One of the most startling findings was that since 2009 the number of youth having sex without contraception with a new partner had increased by 111% in France, 19% in Great Britain and 39% in the U.S. Many respondents indicated that they are embarrassed to speak with their health care providers about contraception and that they cannot rely on their schools to provide comprehensive sex education.

According to the report released with the survey results, "In the U.S., almost a quarter of respondents (24%) who had struggled to access contraception said they were too embarrassed to ask a healthcare professional about it." Additionally, according to the report, it seems that today's youth prefer to access the Internet to find the answers to their questions,

whenever possible. The report states, "With the exception of Kenya, Uganda and Egypt, in all regions web sites and blogs are the preferred source of information on contraception. Within Europe, with the exception of France and Italy, over half of young people use the Internet to get information about contraceptive options."

The report further states that in Europe and the U.S., the main reason that teens gave for not being able to access contraception was that they had run out. "Fear that their parents/relatives would find out" was also a common response across all regions and the main reason given across Latin America. "Another frequently cited reason was that the respondent's partner preferred not to use contraception. This was the most common reason in Singapore (36%), Indonesia (31%) and Egypt (20%) and the second most common reason across Asia Pacific in general and the U.S.," as noted in the report.

Not surprisingly, more than half of respondents in the U.S. (54%), Latin America (55%), Uganda (56%) and Kenya (60%) reported that a close friend or family member had had an unplanned pregnancy in the last few years.

National HIV/AIDS Awareness Days Focus on Numerous At-Risk Groups While Educating the Public on HIV/AIDS

Currently AIDS.gov recognizes eleven national HIV/AIDS awareness days. Although you're probably familiar with the most famous of them all—World AIDS Day on December 1—you may not know about the other days scattered throughout the year. These additional awareness days target varying groups most at-risk for contracting HIV. Since September there have been several awareness days of high importance including National HIV/AIDS and Aging Awareness Day (September 18), National Gay Men's HIV/AIDS Awareness Day (September 27), and National Latino AIDS Awareness Day (October 15).

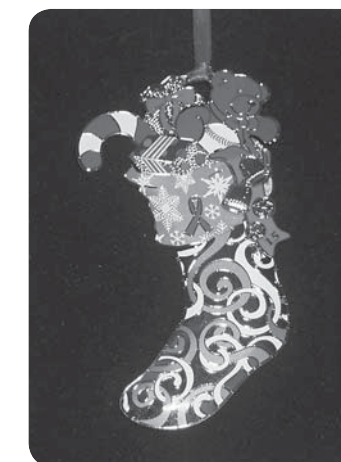
Below are some relevant facts related to these recent awareness days:

- Hispanic males are almost 3 times as likely to have AIDS as compared to white males. (According to 2008 data.)
- Hispanic females are 4.6 times as likely to have AIDS as White females. (According to 2008 data.)
- While men who have sex with men (MSM) represent 2% of the population, they account for 64% of all new infections.
- From 2006 to 2009 new HIV infections rose among young MSM, and young black MSM were the only population with a statistically significant increase in HIV infections in recent years.
- In 2008-2009, the CDC reported persons aged 50 and older accounted for approximately:
 - 17% of new HIV/AIDS diagnoses
 - 36% of persons living with AIDS
 - 24% of all AIDS diagnoses
 - 45% of all deaths of persons with AIDS

On October 8 the Sussex County AIDS Walk was held in Rehoboth Beach. That Walk was coordinated by Consortium staff member, Glen Pruitt, who helped exceed their goal by raising more than \$22,700. That's nearly one-third of what was raised in New Castle County which totaled almost \$70,000, including \$11,500 in sponsorship. It's amazing what can be accomplished through strong leadership and a belief in exceeding goals.

The Kent County AIDS Walk was held in Dover on October 15. At the time of print, no number of Walkers or dollars raised were available.

John Hinkson, Manager of Communications and Special Events said, "The Consortium's team showed yet again that even during difficult financial times it is possible to attain the goals that we set for ourselves.
